Our culture ignores the inevitability of biology, viewing aging and death as optional experiences. This cultural blind-spot is bumping up against the sliver tsunami of the impending baby boomers that come to the aging and dying experience unprepared.

The last film in the series, the *Embrace of Dying*, is an important film that will explore the taboo subject of death and dying. There is a labor coming into the world and a labor in leaving.
